ARE YOU LATE!!!

The school bell rings at 8:35. 8:35 is when students are expected to be here. If they come after 8:35 they are late.

Our students need to be here on time. When students arrive late for school in the morning they are disrupting school and classroom routines, missing out on receiving classroom instruction and important information. Arriving on time allows them the opportunity to prepare for learning (getting their materials organized, removing outdoor wear, going to lockers, etc.). Our entrance bell rings at 8:35. Students should be on school grounds and ready to enter the building at that time. We are striving to teach our students the value of time management, punctuality, respect for others, and good citizenship. We are preparing them for life. Our society values punctuality.

When your child is late our administrative assistant has to manually change every student's attendance. We have close to **40 students** late every day. Many of these students are the same students each day. **In January**, we will be starting **to monitor** students who are chronically late. We will be contacting the parents of these students to discuss how we can help get their children here on time.

Traffic Safety:

Please remember the following:

No parking in the bus loop during the following times:

7:30-8:30 am

2:00-3:00 pm

No entering the parking lot during the day: 8:00- 3:00 as children are present.

No parking in designated fire lanes. They are painted yellow. Please be aware of them. The school bus always has right of way on school property.

Do not park or leave your vehicle in the bus loop when dropping off your children: quick "Kiss and Go"

Do not stop at all on the inside loop!

Drop off at curbside not in the middle. Move to the front of the loop as far as possible.

Registration

Students will register for English programs at the school serving the area (neighbourhood) in which they reside. Students who live in an area of eligibility for Early French Immersion will register at the French Immersion designated school that serves their neighbourhood.

Primary Program


A child must have reached his/her fifth birthday **on or before December 31** of the year they start school.

Parents/guardians must present the child's proof of age, legal name (as listed on birth certificate, passport, immigration papers, legal name change certificate or adoption documents), proof of residency (such as a current utility bill), Nova Scotia Health Card (MSI) number and expiry date at the time of registration.

Out of Area Requests

Parents/guardians may seek placement for their child in a school outside of the neighbourhood in which they reside under the guidelines of the Student Registration Policy.

Parents/guardians may obtain an Out-of-Area Request form at their child's neighbourhood school. Once completed, parents/guardians must forward the Out-of-Area Request form to the requested school on the first school day in April starting at 8:00 a.m.

A Canadian Winter:

Generally speaking, when the temperature reaches -15C or below we assess the appropriateness of sending children outside. We also consider wind chill factors. Wind chill is the cooling sensation caused by the combined effect of temperature and wind. Environment Canada advises there is an "increased risk" of frostbite and hypothermia with a wind chill below -27C. School administration consults the Environment Canada weather website frequently and uses common sense in determining whether or not students should be outside on a given day. We also consider the length of time students will be outside, their activity level (heat generation), and exposure to wind and sun (the sun does have a warming affect, even during the winter months). Whenever possible we do like to see our students being given the opportunity to socialize with friends, rather than staying in their classrooms for extended periods of time. Student safety, health and well-being are always paramount. Parents are encouraged to dress their children appropriately for the weather and possible outdoor play, just as they would at home. Dressing in layers is always helpful along with extra hats and mittens.
