Christmas is a holiday that's celebrated on December 25th. For religious Christians, Christmas is a celebration of Christ's birth. In the Western world, many people celebrate Christmas, some of them for religious reasons and others in a more secular way. Christians observe rituals at Christmas including church attendance and re-enactments of Bible stories surrounding the birth of Christ. Non-religious observers exchange presents, tell stories about Santa Claus, and usually decorate a lighted Christmas tree. In Old English, it was Cristes mæsse, or "Christ mass." Inclement Weather

The Halifax Regional Centre for Education takes great care when making the decision to cancel schools and/or busses in the event of severe or inclement weather. Decisions on school closures and/or bus cancellations are posted on the board's website at www.hrce.ca, on Twitter at www.twitter.com/HRCE_NS, recorded at 902-464-INFO (4636) and communicated to all local radio stations. Families can also receive notice of school and bus cancellations by e-mail or text message by following the link on the front page (left side) of the HRCE website. The weather in Nova Scotia is unpredictable so it's always a good idea for families to have a back-up plan for child care when school is cancelled. Hanukkah also known as the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday commemorating the rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem at the time of the Maccabean Revolt of the 2nd century. Hanukkah is observed for eight nights and days. This year it will be observed from December 2 to December 10th. The festival is observed by illuminating a unique candle holder that has nine branches to hold nine candles. It is known as a Menorah. The typical Menorah consists of eight branches with an additional raised branch. The extra light is called a shamash and is given a distinct location, usually above or below the rest.

Dressing for the Weather:

Winter is with us so it is important to stay warm and dry. Please remember when you send your children to dress them in layers. They should have snow pants, boots, hats, mitts or gloves. It is also wise to send an extra set of mitts or gloves in case they get wet at recess. Children will be going outside in the morning and at lunch so be prepared. We will not send them out if it is colder than -15C but other than that they will be outside.



<u>Kwanzaa</u> is celebrated from December 26 through January 1st.

Established by Maulana Karenga in 1966, Kwanzaa is a holiday that honors African heritage and celebrates family, community and culture. It takes its name from the phrase "matunda ya kwanza," which in Swahili means "first fruits." Kwanzaa's origin lies in the 1960s civil rights and Black Freedom movements. Families gather during Kwanzaa to light the kinara, a candle holder with seven candles in the colors of red, black, and green. The black candle is placed in the center and used to light the other flames from left to right. Together, the candles are called the mishuuma saba, and they represent the Seven Principles.
